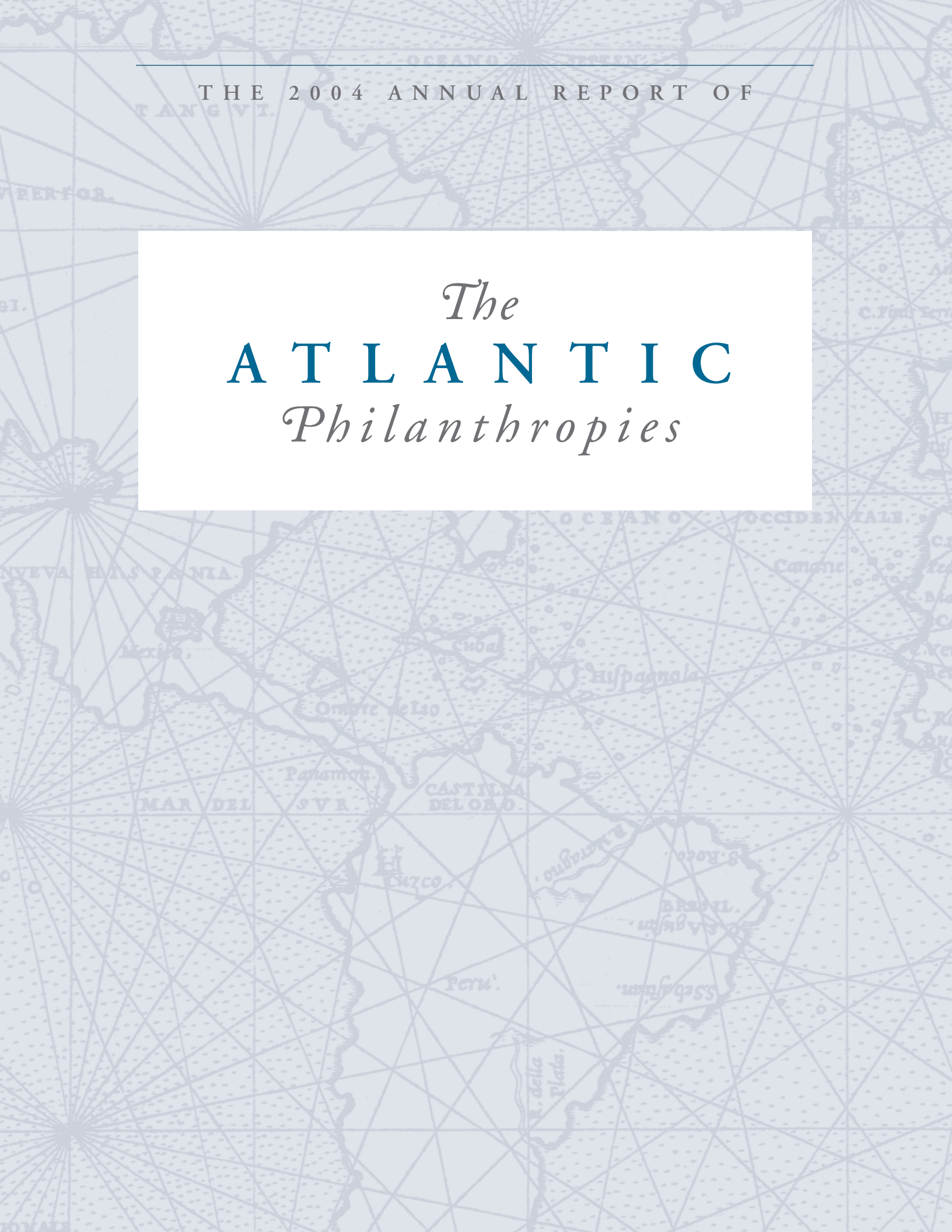


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Overview of The Atlantic Philanthropies

*T*he Atlantic Philanthropies are dedicated to bringing about lasting changes in the lives of disadvantaged and vulnerable people. This is the core value that underpins the foundation's every investment.

Atlantic is a limited-life foundation, one that is committed to spending its entire multibillion-dollar endowment by 2020, in order to make greater and more immediate improvements in the world.

This self-imposed expiration date is in keeping with the spirit and philosophy of our founder, who personally believes in “giving while living”; and follows in the philanthropic footsteps of other notable foundations, including the Julius Rosenwald Fund, the Aaron Diamond Foundation, the Lucille B. Markey Charitable Trust and many others.

Our goal, simply put, is to do as much good as possible, for as many disadvantaged and vulnerable people as possible, as soon as possible. This limited-lifetime approach yields other benefits as well, including giving our work a sense of urgency and motivating us to concentrate more resources on the achievement of fewer objectives.

Atlantic has four areas of philanthropic focus – ageing; disadvantaged children and youth; population health; and reconciliation and human rights. We selected these areas because they represent some of the most critical social problems facing the world today and provide profound opportunities for us to make lasting effects on people's lives.

Within each focus area, we carefully identify the organisations with the expertise to improve the lives of significant numbers of disadvantaged and vulnerable people, and then help these organisations create positive, lasting changes. We support grantee organisations in a variety of endeavors, including efforts to increase their service and programme capacity; disseminate best practises; conduct research that then drives compelling action; and advocate for social change through strategic participation in public-policy debates.

Atlantic concentrates its philanthropic work in seven regions – Australia, Bermuda, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, South Africa, the United States and Viet Nam. We have identified these regions as the ones where the foundation can make the most significant impact in its chosen areas of focus during the next 15 years.

Over the course of more than two decades, Atlantic has awarded approximately 3,700 grants totaling more than \$3 billion. During the next decade and a half, we anticipate awarding grants totaling well over \$4 billion.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW:

A Letter from Our Chief Executive

These are exciting times at The Atlantic Philanthropies. In 2004, our foundation emerged from two years of reflection and strategic planning with a renewed sense of philanthropic purpose and responsibility. Our mission has been newly articulated as: To bring about lasting changes in the lives of disadvantaged and vulnerable people. Our approach to accomplishing this mission has changed substantially.

The most significant decision we made was to become a limited-lifetime foundation and spend our entire endowment by 2020. This decision was inspired by several factors:

- We were motivated by the fact that there remains profound inequity and injustice in the world. We believe that the human race has the means to eradicate more of this inequity than ever before, and that philanthropy enables societies to confront some of the root causes of these inequalities.
- We were inspired by the personal example and philosophy of our founder, who believes in “giving while living” to achieve profound social change during his lifetime. His spirit was epitomized in a recent interview when he said, “If I have \$10 in my pocket and I do something with it today, it is already producing \$10 worth of good.”
- We were encouraged by the success and impact of other foundations that adopted a limited time frame in which to accomplish their missions. Their examples further convinced us that a short period of concentrated investment in the issues we feel most passionately about is likely to bring about greater improvements in the lives of disadvantaged and vulnerable people.

As a result of this self-imposed life expectancy, we began in 2004 the implementation of a number of profound changes and embarked on what will prove to be the last chapter of our philanthropic work. The most notable change, of course, was Atlantic’s decision to concentrate its philanthropy only on four specific issues and seven specific regions:

- The human issues we focus on are: ageing; disadvantaged children and youth; population health; and reconciliation and human rights.
- The regions we work in are: Australia, Bermuda, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, South Africa, the United States and Viet Nam.

With this philanthropic focus pervasive throughout our decision-making process, 2004 saw a number of other significant developments as well. The most notable included:

- The changing of Atlantic's funding strategy to concentrate on making larger grants to fewer grantees. Just as our limited lifespan motivated us to concentrate more of our resources on fewer issues, we recognized we needed to make larger grants to fewer organisations. We identified more than 100 organisations in 2004 that had solid capabilities and focused, meaningful programmes with the potential to influence positively the lives of a substantial number of disadvantaged and vulnerable people.
- The launch of a more rigorous evaluation programme for grantees that included a more searching screening and selection process, a higher level of monitoring, and more explicit reporting and evaluation requirements to help ensure our grants are effective in assisting grantees to bring about the lasting changes they and we seek.
- The adoption of a set of legislative advocacy principles to help guide our investments in organisations that pursue social change through participation in public-policy debates.
- The award of the first grants reflecting our new philanthropic focus and limited time frame — 128 grants in all, totaling \$165.7 million.

In summary, 2004 was a year which witnessed major developments, and in which Atlantic remained true to its mission of bringing about lasting changes in the lives of disadvantaged and vulnerable people.

It was a year in which we adopted a specific time frame for the completion of our work and articulated our new philanthropic focus. It was a year, too, in which we developed more compelling, meaningful relationships with our grantees and became more deeply engaged in social investment than mere grantmaking.

There's a popular saying people sometimes share when they're looking forward to greeting every new day with enthusiasm and a sense of meaningful purpose: "Today is the first day of the rest of your life."

For The Atlantic Philanthropies, 2004 was the first year of the last years of our existence. Between now and then, we intend to work with our grantees to do everything within our power to leave this world a better place.

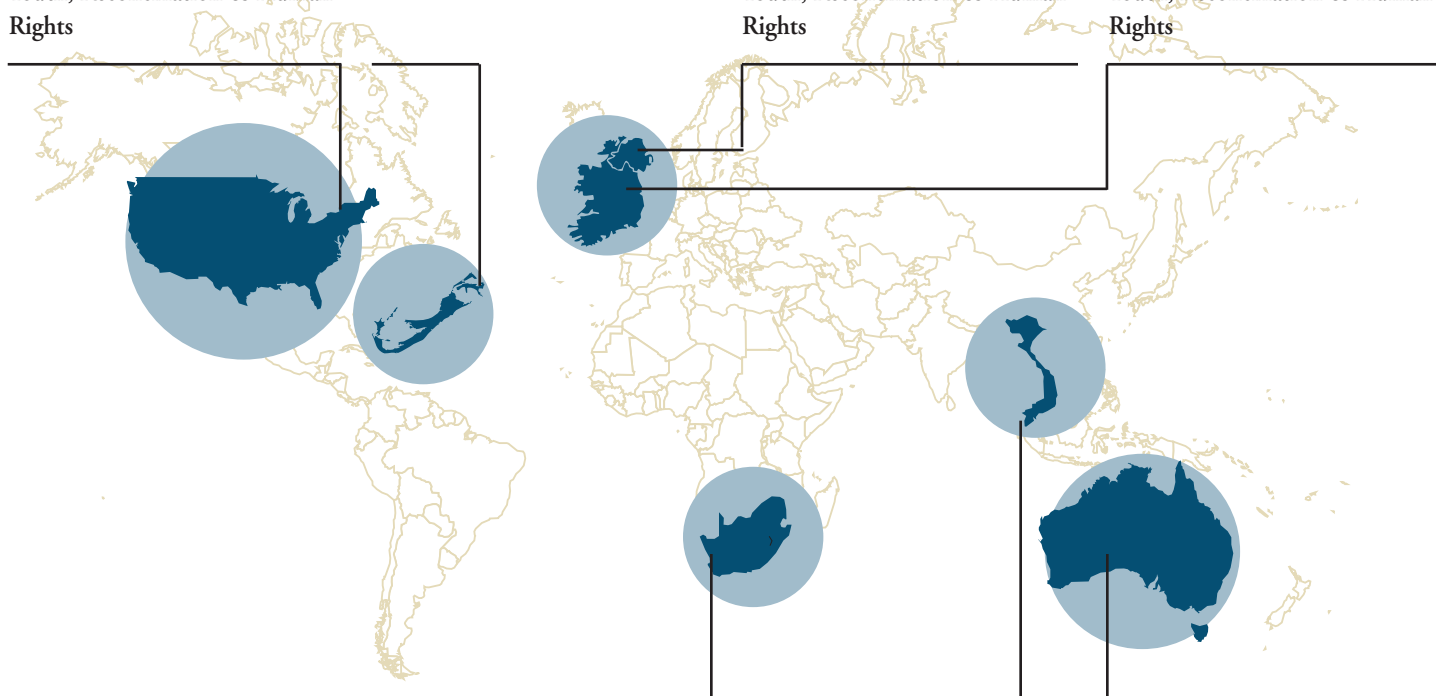

Focus on AGEING

Through its focus on the issue of ageing, The Atlantic Philanthropies seek to bring about lasting improvements in the lives of older adults, transform how ageing is viewed within society and improve the way older persons are treated by society.

Atlantic focuses on ageing in four regions: Bermuda, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland and the United States. Although the foundation has distinct programme objectives for each targeted region, its general aims include ensuring that older adults:

- are treated with dignity and respect;
- are fully empowered to shape their own destinies;
- have access to health and support systems;
- are represented by a strong cadre of leaders; and
- are able to contribute actively their expertise and abilities for the good of society.

In 2004, Atlantic awarded 23 grants – totaling \$33.3 million – to address its philanthropic focus on ageing:

- 2 grants in Bermuda, totaling just over \$218,000
- 1 grant in Northern Ireland, totaling just under \$72,000
- 3 grants in the Republic of Ireland, totaling \$5.6 million
- 17 grants in the United States, totaling \$27.4 million

DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN & YOUTH

Through its focus on the issue of disadvantaged children and youth, The Atlantic Philanthropies seek to bring about lasting improvements in the lives of disadvantaged youngsters that change the trajectory of their lives — keeping them healthy and preventing them from disconnecting from their families and communities. A key focus is on enabling the educational supports crucial for children's success.

Atlantic focuses on disadvantaged youth in four regions: Bermuda, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland and the United States. Although the foundation has distinct programme objectives for each targeted region, its general aims include:

- demonstrating that prevention and early intervention are effective;
- increasing the efficiency of resource allocation;
- supporting influential voices that speak in the interests of disadvantaged children and youth;
- helping to build exemplary programmes and services that target at-risk youth aged 8 to 16; and
- influencing the broader policy frameworks that govern service delivery for low-income children and youth.

In 2004, Atlantic awarded 18 grants — totaling \$25.5 million — to address its philanthropic focus on disadvantaged children and youth:

- 2 grants in Northern Ireland, totaling just over \$3 million
- 6 grants in the Republic of Ireland, totaling nearly \$8 million
- 8 grants in the United States, totaling approximately \$13.8 million
- 2 grants in other regions, totaling about \$700,000

POPULATION HEALTH

Through its focus on the issue of population health, The Atlantic Philanthropies seek to bring about lasting improvements in the health of disadvantaged and vulnerable people by strengthening key components of disease prevention and health care systems.

Atlantic focuses on population health in three regions: Australia, South Africa and Viet Nam. Although the foundation has distinct programme objectives for each targeted region, its general aims include:

- maintaining and developing the capacity of key health institutions;
- supporting the alignment of national health policies with local community interventions;
- increasing national health promotion initiatives;
- increasing the number of population health professionals and health policy analysts – groups essential for strengthening public health organisations;
- improving information systems that monitor health system performance so decision makers have the necessary data to improve resource allocation and service provision;
- targeting neglected health conditions that are causing the greatest suffering, including HIV/AIDS and blindness; and
- building institutions that will lead an enduring transformation of the public health.

In 2004, Atlantic awarded 38 grants — totaling \$70.1 million — to address its philanthropic focus on population health:

- 1 grant in Australia, totaling approximately \$15.2 million
- 10 grants in South Africa, totaling approximately \$8.5 million
- 1 grant in the United States, totaling approximately \$20 million
- 19 grants in Viet Nam, totaling almost \$21.9 million
- 7 grants in other regions, totaling about \$4.5 million

RECONCILIATION & HUMAN RIGHTS

Through its focus on the issues of reconciliation and human rights, The Atlantic Philanthropies aims to increase access to justice, services and human rights for specific vulnerable groups who currently have difficulties accessing their rights.

Atlantic focuses on reconciliation and human-rights issues in four regions: Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, South Africa and the United States. Although the foundation has distinct programme objectives for each targeted region, its general aims include:

- addressing the legacies of violent conflict that prevent movement toward reconciliation, stability and the protection of human rights; and
- ensuring access to justice and public services to enable disadvantaged and vulnerable people to access the rights, justice and services they are entitled to under the law.

In 2004, Atlantic awarded 37 grants — totaling \$25.1 million — to address its philanthropic focus on reconciliation and human rights:

- 1 grant in Northern Ireland, totaling \$53,600
- 8 grants in the Republic of Ireland, totaling \$3.3 million
- 15 grants in South Africa, totaling \$13.3 million
- 11 grants in the United States, totaling just over \$8 million

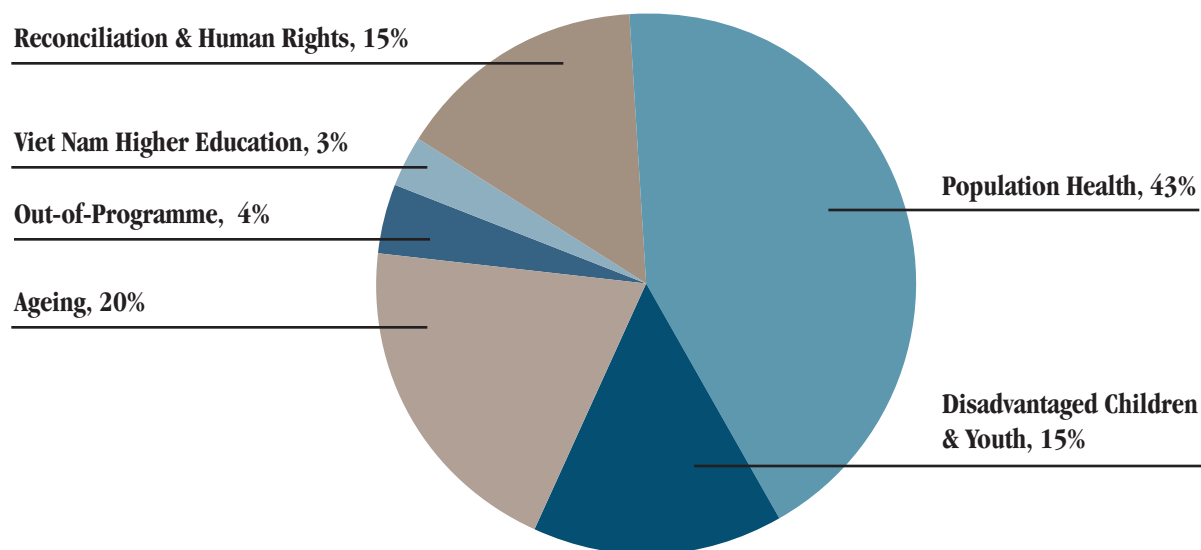

Funding Policy

The Atlantic Philanthropies do not consider unsolicited proposals for funding. The foundation's approach to grantmaking is to seek out organisations in its seven target regions — Australia, Bermuda, Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, South Africa, the United States and Viet Nam — that share Atlantic's philanthropic focus.

In selecting potential organisations for funding, Atlantic searches for institutions that demonstrate strong organisational leadership, evidence of past and current successes, financial strength, and the capacity to implement projects and evaluate their success.

Prior to inviting an organisation to submit an application for funding, Atlantic's programme staff will conduct extensive due diligence on a potential grantee. Occasionally, the foundation will seek external verification of its due diligence.

At the time a grant is awarded, arrangements to monitor progress and report on outcomes are agreed upon with each grantee. Atlantic's aim is to be respectful of the independence of its grantees, to be supportive at all times, but also to be demanding in the achievement of agreed outcomes.

2004 Investment Performance & Strategies

As of 31 December 2004, The Atlantic Philanthropies' endowment totalled approximately \$4 billion. The endowment consists of a diversified portfolio of absolute return strategies, private equity investments, global equities and bonds; as well as interests, via a subsidiary, in hotels, resorts, health clubs, and retailers. Atlantic's total portfolio produced an 11.5 per cent return in 2004 compared to its benchmark performance of 9.4 per cent. The absolute return portfolio generated a 10 per cent return compared to its benchmark performance of 5.8 per cent.

Just as Atlantic's decision to become a limited-life foundation required significant alterations to grantmaking strategies, it also required major changes to its investment strategy. In particular a portfolio needed to be structured which could both protect capital and generate a high return, a combination which is difficult to achieve using only conventional assets such as equities. The current portfolio is therefore structured as follows:

- A core allocation to a diversified portfolio of absolute return strategies. These strategies derive their returns primarily from the skill of the fund manager. Such strategies have little history on which to base assumptions about future return and risk characteristics and have recently experienced a flood of new money which will inevitably drive down returns. Nevertheless, Atlantic believes that a diversified portfolio of such strategies, held as a major component of its endowment, should produce the combination of return and risk needed to meet its requirements. In pursuing such an allocation, the ability to research and access the highest quality managers is essential.
- A well-diversified portfolio of conventional assets is also held as a good complement and partial hedge against the systemic risks inherent in absolute return strategies. Conventional asset classes (global equities, global bonds, commodities...) derive their returns from broad economic trends and risk premia and are not dependent on manager skill. They are also less exposed to some of the systemic risks that might affect the hedge fund industry.
- A portfolio of private equity investments is held to boost long term returns. An allocation to a high returning, but illiquid asset class, such as private equity makes sense to boost returns as long as a sufficiently long life remains and that the highest quality managers can be accessed.
